Why it stands out

- Initiated through children's interests, encouraging engagement and ownership
- Supported by community partnerships
 - Provided hands-on learning about sustainability and healthy eating
- Offered inclusive opportunities for all children to participate and contribute
- Encourages leadership, independence and responsibility through real-life roles and routines
- Fosters a sense of pride, belonging and contribution within the OSHC community

Why it stands out

- Supports all children's understanding of daily routines through clear visual cues
 - Displayed at children's height
- Encourages independence and confidence as children navigate the schedule themselves
 - Aids in transitions between activities, reducing anxiety and uncertainty
- Inclusive of diverse learning needs, especially for visual learners and children with additional needs / children who can not vet read
- Promotes a sense of security and predictability within the OSHC environment

- Supports inclusive practices by catering to diverse learning needs and styles
- Enhances fine motor skills and cognitive development through hands-on activities
- Reflects thoughtful planning and values child-led and sensory rich experiences
- Encourages exploration through touch, sight and sound, supporting holistic development







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
Camp Australia Montmorency OSHC have multiple quiet areas.



- Offers children safe, calm spaces to selfregulate and unwind
- Reflects the needs and interests of the children at the children
- Quiet areas are reduced in sound and light, helping to minimise sensory overstimulation
- Recognises the importance of mental health and emotional wellbeing
- Encourages autonomy by allowing children to choose how they manage their quiet time
- Supports inclusion by catering to children with anxiety, sensory processing needs or those simply needs a break

- Supports hands-on, active learning through real-world, sensory-rich experiences
- Encourages problem-solving, creativity, and resilience through open-ended play and construction

- Create opportunities for children to explore STEM concepts in playful, practical ways



Why it stands out

- Promotes cultural awareness and respect through age-appropriate engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives
- Provides opportunities for meaningful conversations about symbols, stories and cultural traditions
- Encourages creativity, sensory exploration and fine motor development through handson materials
- Incorporates sustainable and natural materials, reflecting a connection to Country and care for the environment

Why it stands out

- Enclosed spaces are reduced in light and sound to support regulation, providing a calm, soothing environment that supports children with sensory processing challenges
- It includes cushions, teddies, books, and visuals that create a safe haven where children can take breaks and recharge on busy days
- There are multiple sensory spaces in both the indoor and outdoor spaces
 - It supports all children's regulation

Why it stands out

- Provides consistent visual cutes to support understanding of routines and expectations
- Real-life images are more easily recognised and understood by children in CBDC services
- Reduces anxiety during transitions by clearly showing what is happening next
- Supports children with communication delays • Encourages independence
- Reinforces language development through pairing images with spoken words
- Enhances inclusivity by offering alternative ways to access and process information
 - Supports smooth group transitions

Why it stands out

- Responds to children's interests, making learning more engaging and meaningful
- Encourages peer interactions and collaboration through shared tabletop spaces
 - Sectioned areas support focus and reduce overstimulation, supporting self-regulation
- Offers a wide range of open-ended materials, supporting imagination, storytelling and inquiry
- Invites children to explore connection between books, animals and real-world concepts
 Instils a love of learning
 - Use of tablecloths/mats on table tops helps reduce noise

- Offers a range of wet and dry sensory experiences supporting diverse sensory preferences and needs
- Incorporate children's interests in increase participation
- Encourages exploration, creativity, and experimentation though hands-on materials
- Supports self-regulation and calming through tactile play
 - Builds fine motor skills and cognitive development in engaging, play-based ways
- Provides inclusive opportunities for all children to participate and express themselves
- Reflects intentional planning to enrich learning through sensory-rich environments

- Promotes creativity and open-ended play as children explore the materials without fixed outcomes
 - It is well stocked, however supports sustainability by modelling recycling and repurposing
- Organised containers at children's height encourages independence
- Low-cost and inclusive, making rich play opportunities accessible to all
- Inspires problem solving, innovation, and critical thinking through unstructured exploration
